

Current Staffing Levels

Sergeants – Authorized 2, full strength

Corporals – Authorized 2, full strength

Officers – Authorized 13, down 3 positions

School Resource Officers – Authorized 2, full strength

Full-Time Dispatchers – Authorized 5, full strength

Part-Time Dispatchers – Authorized 2, down 1 position

We lost several officers and dispatchers who joined larger agencies attracted by pay incentives

A current recruitment attracted a total of 10 applicants for Police Officerwe have 4 police officer applicants in backgrounds

Challenges for 2017

- Proposition 109 Passed in 2011 by Governor Brown, the intent of this bill was to stop the revolving door of those sent to jail and allow send them to the local level for monitoring and programs
- Proposition 47 Passed by voters in 2014, reduced 7 felonies to misdemeanors to again avoid overcrowding. Has resulted in increase in property crimes and recidivism as high as 60% in some cities



Challenges for 2017

- Proposition 57– Passed in 2016 by the voters, reduced sentencing for "non-violent" offenders to include early release for good behavior. Over 25,000 inmates are retroactively eligible for release. Allows prison officials not judges to determine eligible inmates.
- Proposition 64 Passed by voters in 2016, allows the use of recreational marijuana. Numerous laws related to enforcement will result in an rise of related issues.
- Body/In-Car videos requests have exploded significantly increasing staff workload.

Challenges for 2017

- Misdemeanor Criminal non-filings Those who have been arrested for misdemeanor but later not filed upon will require law enforcement to remove any reference to the arrest in Records Management System and notify parties of such action by mail. Is retroactive at least 3 years.
- Assembly Bill 953 Signed by Governor Brown in 2015, will require law enforcement to report on 13 specific demographics to Sacramento on an annual basis to include reason for stops, whether subject was searched or arrested, ethnicity of subject and officer demographics.




